

What: Closing the Loop: An Effective CAPA System

Requirements of Corrective and Preventive Action (CAPA) are some of the most frequent observations cited in FDA 483s and warning letters. A robust CAPA system is essential to a firm's overall Quality Management System (QMS). This presentation will examine those requirements and their role in effectively managing a closed-loop CAPA system. In addition, we will explore CAPA systems and their connection to other requirements of the Quality System.


From the West:
